

Services Provided to Early Childhood Providers

Tooth decay remains one of the most common chronic diseases of childhood. The Mississippi State Department of Health, Office of Oral Health is helping childcare programs to provide preventive dental services and access to care for children enrolled in early childhood learning centers.

(1) Make a Child's Smile

How the Program Works

A licensed dental hygienist will perform a dental screening for your child at no cost to you or the center. A dental screening can identify problems or disease conditions that need further evaluation by a dentist. A dental screening does not take the place of a dental exam, but it can identify the need for a preventive fluoride varnish, which is then provided to your child at no charge. Varnish is a protective coating that is painted on teeth to help prevent tooth cavities. It is safe and recommended for application at least two times per year.

How to participate

For your child/students to receive this service, you must complete and return a Make a Child's smile parental consent form to your child's teacher. The results of your child's screening will be provided to you in writing. The Mississippi State Department of Health, Office of Oral Health will not bill Medicaid for the fluoride varnish application. Your child's preventive service data may be shared with other dental and health care providers that see your child for care.

(2) Cavity-Free Kids Educational Training for Child Care Providers and parents

Cavity Free Kids is a free train-the-trainer oral health curriculum that provides education about dental cavities and how they can be prevented.

This curriculum was developed for childcare directors and staff who work closely with parents and children. Those who participate will acquire knowledge, skills, and resources to educate families and children. Hands-on training includes exercises that are fun and easy for parents and children to understand. Childcare staff will receive two contact hours for attending.

Under Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, provisions are made to provide early intervention services for infants and toddlers with disabilities or who have conditions that are likely to lead to developmental delays. In Mississippi, the Part C program is known as First Steps.
The goals of early intervention are to: * Identify and connect all infants and toddlers with disabilities and their families with early intervention services and supports; * Enhance children's development by helping families and caregivers learn strategies and skills to meet their children's needs; and * Reduce the later need for/expense of special education and institutionalization by maximizing the independent living of individuals with disabilities
Children who are eligible are between the ages of birth to 45 days before the child's third birthday. The must show significant delays in one or more of the five areas of development, including physical, adaptive, cognitive, communication, and social-emotional, have a diagnosed condition likely to lead to a developmental delay without intervention, or have a clinician provide a justification for early intervention services.
Families who have a qualifying child are connected with professionals with specialized training in working with young children and families on development, including special instructors, speech therapists, occupational therapists, and physical therapists. Most often, they will work with families and caregivers in the child's natural environments, including early care and education centers, to help them learn skills to work with their child.
Anyone with information on a child can make a referral! Often early care and education providers are the first people to notice that a child has delays in development, so you are a valuable partner in helping us identify infants and toddlers and linking them to needed services.

Hearing Loss is one of the most common birth defects, with approximately 3 of every 1000 babies born identified with some degree of hearing loss at birth. To ensure they are identified and receive intervention as early as possible, each state has established an Early Hearing Detection and Intervention Program, commonly called EHDI (pronounced like Eddie).
The Early Hearing Detection and Intervention Program in Mississippi tracks all babies born in the state to ensure they receive hearing screenings by one month of age. EHDI-MS also tracks the children who do not pass hearing screening, to ensure the receive a diagnostic exam by an audiologist and confirmation of their hearing status by three months of age. If the diagnostic exam reveals they have hearing loss, EHDI-MS refers them to the Mississippi First Steps EIP for early intervention services by six months of age.
These timelines are known as the EHDI 1-3-6 goals!
As important as it is to identify children who are born with hearing loss, it is also important to identify those children who develop hearing loss after birth. An additional 3 in 1000 at children will have late onset hearing loss by the time they reach school age. So the EHDI-MS has a new Initiative to help identify children with late onset hearing loss: the Early Childhood Hearing Outreach (ECHO) Initiative.
The EHDI-MS is looking for early care and education providers to partner on conducting periodic hearing screening for infants and toddlers up to three years of age. As part of this project, early care and education programs will complete and agreement with the EHDI-MS and receive access to hearing screening devices, training to appropriately use these devices, and report the hearing screening results back to the EHDI-MS program to ensure those who do not pass will receive follow-up evaluations.

Fact Sheet #46: Daycare Centers and Preschools Under the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA)

This fact sheet provides general information on how the FLSA applies to daycare centers and preschools.

Characteristics

Daycare centers and preschools provide custodial, educational, or developmental services to preschool age children to prepare them to enter elementary school grades. This includes nursery schools, kindergartens, head start programs, and any similar facility primarily engaged in the care and protection of preschool age children. Individuals who care for children in their home are not considered daycare centers unless they have employees to assist them with the care of the children.

Coverage

The 1972 Amendments to the FLSA specifically extended FLSA coverage to preschools as covered "enterprises," regardless of whether public or private or operated for profit or not for profit, and without regard to the annual dollar volume of the business. As a result, all such enterprises are required to comply with applicable provisions of the FLSA.

Requirements

The FLSA requires covered employers to:

- Establish the workweek for pay purposes (7 consecutive 24-hour periods), which may begin on any day of the week in the employer's discretion (but remains fixed once established).
- Maintain complete and accurate records of each employee's daily and weekly hours worked each week.
- Pay at least the federal <u>minimum wage</u> to all nonexempt employees of not less than \$7.25 per hour effective July 24, 2009, for all hours actually worked.
- Pay at least one-and-one-half times each employee's regular rate of pay as <u>overtime compensation</u> to each nonexempt employee for all hours worked over 40 in each workweek.
- Comply with all <u>youth employment standards</u>, such as restrictions on working hours, operating certain equipment, or performing work in certain occupations for minors under age 16 and, if under age 18, restrictions against performing certain hazardous occupations (which include driving a school bus, among others).

Preschool Teachers: Bona fide teachers in preschool and kindergarten settings may qualify for exemption from the minimum wage and overtime pay requirements as "professionals" under the same conditions as a teacher in an elementary or secondary school. Teachers are exempt if their primary duty is teaching, tutoring, instructing or lecturing in this activity as a teacher in educational establishment. It should be noted that, although a preschool may engage in some educational activities, preschool employees whose primary duty is to care for the physical needs of the facility's children would ordinarily not meet the requirements for exemption as teachers under the applicable regulations.

FS 46

Rest and Meal Periods: Employers that authorize short breaks or rest periods must count them as hours worked. Rest periods of short duration, usually 20 minutes or less, are common in industry (and promote employee efficiency) and are customarily paid for as working time. *Bona fide* meal periods (typically 30 minutes or more) generally need not be compensated as work time as long as the employee is completely relieved from duty for the entire meal period for the purpose of eating a regular meal. The employee is not relieved from duty if required to perform any duties, whether active or inactive, while eating. Thus, an employee is not considered "relieved" if required to continue to watch over children while they and the employee eat their meal.

Lectures, Meetings and Training Programs: Attendance at lectures, meetings, training programs, and similar activities must be counted as working time unless all four of the following criteria are met: (1) it occurs outside normal scheduled hours of work; (2) it is completely voluntary; (3) it is not job-related (unless the employee attends an independent school or college on his/her own initiative outside work hours); and, (4) no other work is performed during the period. The time spent attending training that is required by the state for day care center licensing is working time for which employees must be compensated.

Typical Problems

Issues that the Wage and Hour Division's experience has shown to be problems in the industry include:

- 1. not recording all <u>hours of work</u>, for instance, taking someone off the clock for lunch even though the person is required to remain with children and supervise them, attending parent staff meetings, running errands for the employer such as going to the grocery store, *etc.*;
- 2. employees reporting early or staying late who are paid a flat fee for this extra time, instead of paying proper <u>overtime</u> (time-and-one-half the regular rate of pay) for such extra hours;
- 3. taking improper <u>deductions</u> from employees' pay, such as for items that primarily benefit the employer, which causes them to be paid less than <u>minimum wage</u> or which cuts into the overtime due the employee;
- 4. classifying employees, who do not meet all the tests for <u>exemption</u>, as exempt teachers and not paying such non-exempt staff appropriate overtime compensation; and
- 5. paying <u>overtime</u> compensation after 80 hours in two weeks instead of the required <u>overtime payment</u> after 40 hours in each week.

Family and Medical Leave Act

The Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) requires that FMLA-covered employers allow eligible employees to take up to a total of 12 workweeks of unpaid leave during any 12-month period for:

- 1. birth and care of a newborn child of the employee;
- 2. placement with the employee of a son or daughter for adoption or foster care, and to care for the newly-placed child;
- 3. care for a child, spouse or parent with a serious health condition; and
- 4. medical leave when the employee is unable to work because of a serious health condition.

The FMLA applies to all public agencies, including state, local and federal employers, local education agencies (schools), and to private sector employers who employed 50 or more employees in 20 or more workweeks in the current or preceding calendar year. To be eligible for FMLA benefits, an employee must have worked for the employer for a total of 12 months, have worked at least 1,250 hours over the previous 12 months, and work at a location where at least 50 employees are employed by the employer within 75 miles.

These workshops are excellent for informal educators such as scout leaders, camp leaders, and youth leaders of any kind! CEU credit is available. The following workshops are available:

- Project WILD capitalizes on the natural interest that children and adults have in wildlife by providing hands-on activities that enhance student learning in all subject and skill areas K-12. Project WILD helps educators guide students through a process that begins with awareness, moves toward understanding, challenges preconceived notions, and instills the confidence, skills, and motivation to take responsible action on behalf of the environment.
- Project WET, for grades K-12, is a collection of innovative, water-related activities that are
 hands-on, easy to use, and fun! Project WET activities incorporate a variety of formats, such as
 large and small group learning, whole-body activities, laboratory investigations, discussion of
 local and global topics, and involvement in community service projects.
- Growing Up WILD features new activities designed to stimulate young children in new and
 exciting ways while connecting them to nature and many of its wonders. Growing Up WILD is a
 national early childhood initiative that builds literacy skills and environmental appreciation
 among early learners through participation in engaging wildlife-based educational activities.
 This workshop is suggested for teachers that work with ages 3-7.
- Flying WILD introduces students to bird conservation through standards-based classroom activities and environmental stewardship projects. Flying WILD encourages schools to work closely with conservation organizations, community groups, and businesses involved with birds to implement school bird festivals and bird conservation projects. This workshop is for teachers that work with grades K-12.
- WILD Aquatic is an aquatic wildlife and aquatic ecosystems focused conservation education
 program for K-12 educators and their students. Project WILD Aquatic capitalizes on the natural
 interest that children and adults have in aquatic wildlife by providing hands-on activities that
 enhance student learning in all subject and skill areas.
