Overview

In 1998 the Mississippi Legislature passed House Bill 609, which addresses the critical teacher shortage in state, with Section 13 of this bill providing for the University Assisted Teacher Recruitment and Retention Program. As a result of Section 13 of House Bill 609, the Mississippi Teacher Fellowship Program (MTFP) is designed as an innovative partnership among Alcorn State University, Delta State University, Mississippi Valley State University, and the University of Mississippi. The MTFP Program Office is housed in the School of Education at the University of Mississippi.

Mission

The purpose of the MTFP is to attract qualified teachers to the critical teacher shortage areas of Mississippi. The MTFP addresses teacher shortage, emphasizing graduate education programs, through the use of financial incentives for the recruitment of teachers nationally, while integrating the use of technology as a key component in the induction and retention of new teachers in shortage districts. The MTFP represents a partnership of four major public institutions of higher learning in Mississippi, with all other remaining institutions, both private and public, affiliating with the program (see Appendix A).

Recruitment, Retention & Induction July 2013 to June 2014

- 1. In recruiting the class of 2013, superintendents and principals representing Mississippi's forty-eight (48) critical shortage districts were mailed MTFP information packets, including application materials to be distributed to new hires in their district/school. Posters were also included in the packets to be used for display on bulletin boards.
- **2.** Deans of the Schools of Education for each institution of higher learning in Mississippi were mailed information packets and application materials to be distributed to interested graduates of their institution.
- 3. On-site recruitment trips were made to eleven (11) Mississippi institutions of higher learning campuses offering graduate programs in education. Representatives from the MTFP Program office attended student teacher seminars to recruit upcoming graduates.
- 4. The 2013 Fellows received posters and applications for distribution within their district to recruit future Fellows.
- 5. The MTFP worked in conjunction with the Mississippi Teacher Center for out-of-state recruitment purposes. Recruiters from the Mississippi Teacher Center attended select job fairs across the nation, in which information regarding the MTFP program was distributed.
- 6. Post cards were mailed to former applicants to remind them to reactivate or update their files for consideration for the 2013-2014 program year. Additionally, as the deadline for applications approached, post cards were mailed to persons who had started the application process, yet their files were incomplete.
- 7. The MTFP toll-free number (1-888-611-5160) encourages interested applicants to inquire about the program free of charge. Additionally, MTFP Fellows continue to use the toll-free number to call in for support or

assistance as needed.

- 8. The MTFP home page is a key recruitment tool in distributing program information internationally, including a computer generated application form for completion and downloading and other pertinent resource links.
- 9. Orientation for the 2013 Fellows was held in July 2013 at the University of Mississippi-Oxford. Orientation is a one-day event that serves as a means for Fellows to meet in person the other MTFP participants, program staff, and their chat facilitators. Fellows are given a MTFP Handbook, covering all policies and procedures for their participation in the program. Additionally, all Fellows participated in technology training practicing all skills relating to the online communication that MTFP offers. Fellows received a MTFP t-shirt, tote bag, and representatives from the Mississippi Department of Education Teacher Center and the Mississippi Institutions of Higher Learning were in attendance.
- 10. The MTFP home page provides Fellows with Internet links of educational resources. Fellows may focus on specific content area needs through the Educational Links site which connects them to www.education-world.com The general Links site on the homepage connects Fellows with an expansive list of Mississippi educational resources including services within the Mississippi Department of Education and each Mississippi Institution of Higher Learning. The MTFP homepage utilizes a direct link to Blackboard where participants associated with the MTFP Program may send electronic mailing to other participants and communicate through chats, discussion boards, etc.
- 11. E-mail communication continues to be a means of keeping in touch with Fellows both among their cohort group and with the MTFP Program Office. Each Fellow is required to have an Internet provider and e-mail address. The MTFP program office sends by email the MTFP Daily News as a means of keeping in contact with first-year Fellows and updating them on programmatic issues as well as highlights of success stories of Fellows.
- 12. Chat rooms continue to be a retention tool utilized through the MTFP webpage by content area. Faculty chat coordinators, who are experts in their content area, are paid to facilitate the chat sessions and offer

guidance and suggestions to the Fellows. Each first-year Fellow is required to participate in chat room sessions twice-a-month to share professional development ideas with their peer Fellows. These chat rooms are comprised of Fellows who teach similar grades or subjects the online format allows Fellows to discuss common problems, share successes in teaching strategies, and recommend effective changes. The MTFP program office staff monitors attendance and participation in this required retention component.

- 13. Town Meeting Discussion Boards took place for second-year fellows. The format allowed Fellows to research a topic online and post that research/article link on the MTFP Discussion Board for review. This medium allows all Fellows to share pertinent research and continue their professional development. Topics researched included: Illiteracy: The Downfall of American Society; Academics in Preschool; Class Size; Accountability for Educators; Performance Based Pay for Teachers; Governor Bryant Signs Education Reform Bill into Law.
- 14. To further develop cohort *esprit de corps* among Fellows, t-shirts are used to visibly show support of the MTFP. Tote bags with the MTFP emblems are issued to Fellows and Mentors. Additionally, birthday greetings and season's greetings are sent out to Fellows. Good news is shared in the daily/weekly email correspondence with Fellows.

Placement & Profile

August 2013 to June 2014

For the 2013-14 MTFP program year ...

The MTFP program office received approximately one hundred five (105) completed applications for fifty (50) available slots for the 2013 cohort.

Fifty (50) new Fellows were selected for the MTFP 2013 cohort (see Appendix C for a list of Fellows: 2011 through 2013).

- At the end of the fiscal year, one hundred forty-six (146) Fellows (total) remained in thirty-eight (38) different geographical shortage districts (see Appendix D).
- Eleven (11) out of twelve (12) eligible institutions of higher learning in Mississippi offering graduate programs in education enrolled Fellows in Master of Education or Educational Specialist degree programs (see Appendix E).
- One hundred three (103) Fellows enrolled in Master of Education degree programs and forty-three (43) Fellows enrolled in Educational Specialist degree programs.

Evaluation & Attrition

August 2013 to May 2014

Overview

Based on a Likert Scale questionnaire (1 to 5 scale, with 5 representing the highest level of satisfaction), Fellows evaluated their level of satisfaction with the MTFP Orientation (see Appendix F for sample questionnaire).

Notes: The lowest scored category was "Computer/Technology sessions were informative" with a combined score of 4.68 (up from the previous year of 4.34). The highest scored category was "My questions and concerns were addressed" with a combined score of 4.89.

Attrition

Fifty (50) Fellows were accepted into the MTFP for the 2013 cohort, with the program year beginning in August 2013. The 2011, 2012 and 2013 cohort groups of Fellows represent one hundred forty-six (146) teachers total after accounting for attrition as follows:

At the conclusion of the academic year in May 2014, a total of three (3) Fellows were identified as withdrawn from the program as follows: One (1) 2011 Fellow withdrew due to personal reasons. One (1) 2012 Fellow was dismissed for failure to meet program requirements. One (1) 2013 was dismissed from the program due to poor academic standing in her graduate degree program.

Recommendations

2013-2014 Program Year

Recommendations for the <u>2013-2014 program year</u> were successfully completed or addressed as follows:

- Re-evaluate the computer technology training session to better meet needs of participants.
- 2. Enhance recruitment and communication by looking at means of social media and partnering with MDE's "Teacher Talk".
- 3. Evaluate the cost/possibility of purchasing Ipads for the incoming participants as a recruitment/retention component of the program.

Recommendations for the 2014-2015 program year are:

- 1. Implement a "Spotlight" feature on MTFP website highlighting a Fellow with a blurb regarding any recognition of / or exciting things going on in their classroom.
- 2. Continue communications with schools that house MTFP Fellows including more promotional materials for MTFP.
- 3. Create a PowerPoint or video of computer training session to utilize during MTFP Orientation in addition to posting information on website for Fellows.
